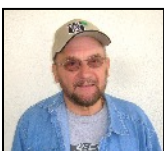

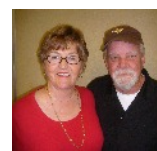

A Tribute to America

I received this information from a member who thought it might be worth including in our newsletter. I agree.

It's something everyone would rally around. Every time you see it, it means something. A symbol of freedom, but also a symbol of hope - Ben Salzmann, President & CEO, ACUITY Insurance.

Standing 400 feet tall, the new Acuity Insurance Flagpole is the tallest flagpole in North America. Visible from a considerable distance, the flagpole is located on the company's headquarters campus along Interstate 43 between Milwaukee and Green Bay on Lake Michigan.



Erecting a flagpole of such height where temperatures frequently fall below zero has required a team of experts to ensure structural integrity and maintainability. The pole supports a 60-foot-wide by 120-foot-long American flag. A brick paver patio featuring the names of Sheboygan County residents killed in active duty is installed at the flagpole's base.



Flagpole Facts: -

- * 400-foot flagpole weighs approximately 420,000 pounds
- * There are two versions of the 60- by 120-foot flag:
- * 220 pound flag is flown during normal conditions
- * 350 pound flag is flown during harsher weather
- * Each star is 3 feet high and each stripe is 4 1/2 feet wide
- * 680 cubic yards of concrete used in foundation
- * Over 500 gallons of paint cover the pole
- * 11-foot diameter at base tapers to 5 1/2-foot diameter at top
- * Three pendulum-style tuned mass dampers reduce movement and vibration
- * Designed to withstand a low temperature of -42°F
- * Cost \$450,000

Vidak Measure Would Stop Hidden Gas Tax

Sacramento - Senator Andy Vidak (R-Hanford) today introduced Senate Bill 1079, which would stop a hike in gasoline and diesel prices that could range from 16 to 76 cents a gallon every time Californians fill up starting January 1, 2015.

"Gasoline isn't a luxury for most Californians, it is a necessity," said Vidak. "Families throughout our state are struggling to just feed their families and clothe their children. The last thing folks need right now is another devastating hit to their wallet."

The California Air Resources Board (CARB) and the Brown Administration secretly created the unauthorized gas tax without public knowledge or legislative approval. Beginning January 1, 2015, the CARB mandate will require companies that sell transportation fuels into the California market to comply with the cap-and-trade program regulation beginning January 1, 2015.

SB 1079 would exempt transportation fuels—including gasoline, diesel, and natural gas—from the state's cap-and-trade program. California already has the highest gas prices in the nation. According to GasBuddy, the average cost for gasoline in California is \$4.12 per gallon and the national average is \$3.68.

"Communities that I represent already suffer from extreme poverty and some of the highest unemployment rates in the state and the country. Our food banks are overwhelmed with people waiting in food lines and our farmers have to fallow fields because of the drought," said Vidak. "This is an unfair hidden tax that will hurt vulnerable Californians the most. It must be stopped."

On May 23, Vidak attended the launch of the "Fed Up at the Pump" campaign at the three B's Truck and Auto Plaza in Lodi. "Fed Up at the Pump" is a grassroots coalition of business owners and their employees, consumers and advocates who are concerned about the negative impact the hidden gas tax will have on California, especially the Central Valley.

A similar bill, AB69, introduced by Assemblyman Perea would look to delay the implementation of the "Hidden Tax" for 3 years or until a more reasonable solution can be developed.

The ACCC strongly supports both pieces of legislation but would favor the complete removal of the "Hidden Tax" over a delay. We strongly urge all ACCC Members as well as all car guys & gals to contact Governor Brown today and let him know that you support SBI079 and AB69 and oppose the implementation of the "Hidden Tax" on California's drivers. FROM THE SHOP BENCH by Bob Travis



The following information is taken from an article written by Jerry Schlorff which appeared in the "Script A News".

Modern Model A Filter

The Model A never came with an air filter, and it is amazing that the motors lived for more than 80 years, especially considering the types of roads they were primarily driven on. Many of us like to use some sort of filter on our cars due to the cost of overhauling nowadays.

One of the big complaints of people trying to use modern day paper type filters is that they restrict the airflow and cause the Model A to run rich and foul the plugs. There have been numerous articles written on how to change the vent system on the carb to prevent this type of problem. Another problem that has been reported is loss of power and gas mileage. The air maze filter that was used during the early days was just a wire mesh which about all it did was to filter out rocks and birds.

This past winter I was looking through my catalog that I received from Bert's Model A Parts in Denver, Colorado. They are a long time Model A supplier both original and reproduction parts. In their catalog they had a K&N air filter that fits right on the carb, either a Tillotson or Zenith. The flange of the filter is made of a Neoprene type material and comes with its own clamp. The K&N air filter is know for being a high performance unit and is washable and comes with extra oil for treating the filter after you clean it. The filter is actually made for motorcycles which have high RPM motors and draw a high volume of air. I figured I would try one and see how it worked. I put it on this spring before we went to the Michigan round-up in Kalamazoo. On that trip I got just as good of mileage as anyone else. I had no loss of power and when I pulled the plugs and checked them out they were burning a nice tan color, just as they should be.

Now, not everyone wants to make any alterations to their Model A, and that is fine. But if you want to give your engine some cleaner air to breath, this filter has been working well for me. And even if you have a show car that you drive, you can run this filter and it only takes about ten seconds to remove it. All you have to do is loosen the hose clamp and take it off. The nice thing about this filter is that you can get them at most any auto parts store. If they don't have one in stock, they can usually have it in a couple of days. One of our members got one at Autozone for about \$35. That's pretty close to what an Airmaze sells for. The part number for the K&N filter is RU-3350.


